11. ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND HISTORICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR OVERSEAS CO-OPERATION

Aden.—Mr. Gerald Lankester Harding's illustrated Report, Archaeology in the Aden Protectorates, was published in the spring of 1964 by H.M. Stationery Office for the Department of Technical Co-operation. The survey provides a record of archaeological sites in Aden and emphasizes the urgent needs for more detailed investigation and for systematic conservation. It was carried out by the Aden Government

on the recommendation of the Academy's Archaeological and Historical Advisory Committee for Overseas Co-operation, with the aid of an allocation from the Colonial Development and Welfare Research Fund.

12. ARCHAEOLOGICAL SALVAGE-WORK IN NUBIA.—The British contribution to the international campaign organized by UNESCO to save the relics of ancient civilizations and cultures in Nubia is now almost complete.

During the last six months the very remarkable Middle Kingdom fortress of Buhen in the Sudan, with a defensive perimeter of more than a mile, has been completely excavated, and we now have for the first time comprehensive records of Egyptian military architecture of c. 1900 B.C. Work in the season 1963–4 was concentrated on the area lying below the foundations of the temple of Hatshepsut, which was dismantled in the previous season and now awaits re-crection at Khartoum. As expected, the buildings in this part of the fortress were well preserved, and they included the original mud-brick temple of the Middle Kingdom, a structure unique of its kind. Attention was also paid to the much-denuded defences on the outer perimeter of the fortress; contrary to previous belief, these were not a New Kingdom addition but were a part of the original fortifications. Moreover, there were two defence systems: one with round towers, built probably by Senusret I; the other, with square towers, built by Senusret III.

Also at Buhen, the Old Kingdom town, the discovery of which pushed back the history of Egyptian colonization in the south by 400 years to the age of the Pyramid builders, has now been finally explored and

recorded.

All that now remains of the British commitments in Sudanese Nubia is the necropolis of Kor, situated near the head of the Second Cataract. This work is limited in extent and will be accomplished early in the season 1964–5.

With regard to the 'finds', the British expedition has been particularly fortunate during the recent season and, following a generous division by the Sudan Government Antiquities Service, it has been possible to bring home twenty-seven large cases of antiquities for the enrichment of museums in this country.

In Egypt itself the Egypt Exploration Society's expedition had a somewhat sensationally productive season. Work was directed to the exploration of the fortified town of Kasr Ibrim, the ancient Premis, which was at one time the southernmost frontier of the Roman Empire. It was mainly concentrated on the excavation of the notable early Christian church which dominated the citadel of the town. Here in the crypt was found the untouched burial of a bishop, and with it were two perfectly preserved illuminated paper scrolls dated to A.D. 1372, one in Coptic and the other in Arabic with a length of more than 15 feet. These unique documents are deeds of authority from the Patriarch for

the consecration of the bishop. Further excavation in the church resulted in the discovery of more documents of the period, written in Greek, Coptic, and Old Nubian, on paper, papyrus, and leather, a veritable treasure-trove for the philologist. Until further study, the value of this mass of written material cannot be estimated, and therefore, with the agreement of the Egyptian Antiquities Service, the division has been postponed. In these circumstances the Society has requested permission to bring the scrolls for study and exhibition in London, to be later returned to Cairo for division. The decision of the Egyptian authorities on this request is awaited.

Excavation of the rest of the town at Ibrim will be finished in 1964-5, and the completion of this work will fulfil the commitments of the United Kingdom in the over-all scheme of research-work in Nubia.

It is now opportune to review the nature and extent of the British contribution as a whole to the Nubian salvage scheme. It falls under four main heads:

- 1. A survey of visible remains of antiquity along the banks of the Nubian Nile.
 - 2. The excavation of selected sites of importance.

3. The removal of temples threatened by the new inundation to safe sites in Egypt, the Sudan, or elsewhere.

4. The preservation of two sites, namely the island of Philae with its temples, and the great rock-cut, elaborately sculptured shrines of Rameses II and his queen at Abu Simbel.

In regard to (1), a British expedition in the name of the Egypt Exploration Society and directed by Professor W. B. Emery and Mr. H. S. Smith has carried out a survey of the antiquities of the Nubian Nile within Egypt.

In regard to (2), Professor Emery has excavated the fortress of Buhen in the Sudan and will proceed to the excavation of the necropolis of Kor, higher up the river. At the same time he and his colleagues

have been working at Kasr Ibrim in Egypt.

In regard to (3), Professor Emery has removed the temple of Hatshep-

sut at Buhen (see above).

Under (4), Philae is to be preserved by dams built with funds from the U.S.A., whilst the United Kingdom has transferred £76,000 from British funds 'frozen' in Egypt towards the international project for carving up and rebuilding at a higher level the two temples at Abu Simbel.

In addition to the contribution to the last project, H.M. Government has since 1960 provided through the Academy special grants amounting to £43,000 for projects 1-3.

13. JERUSALEM EXCAVATIONS.—Excavations in Jerusalem were continued in 1963 with the aid of a grant from the Academy and in collaboration with the École Biblique and the Royal Ontario Museum.

The main objective of the excavations remains the tracing and dating of the city walls of various periods south of the present Old City, as the best means of providing an outline of the chronology of the site. In the first two seasons the position of the walls of the early city was located well down the eastern slope at a point 160 feet further east than the wall hitherto attributed to this period. In 1963 the tracing of these walls was continued, but the excavation is not yet complete. The most interesting find in this neighbourhood was an extra-mural sanctuary, which is still extending beyond the excavated area. A beginning was also made in an attempt to locate the city-walls on the western side of the eastern ridge. The necessary depth has not yet been reached, but one of the excavations has reached the levels of an important Herodian structure. It is certainly a public building, and is probably extra-mural, but further clearance is required to identify it; an amphitheatre is a possibility.

The 1963 season also completed the excavation of the site south of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. The site provided conclusive evidence as to the possibility of the church being on the authentic site of Calvary, to an extent quite unexpected from the smallness of the area explored. At a depth of 50 feet, bedrock was reached. It had been quarried in the seventh century B.C., and over the seventh-century fill of the quarry there was no occupation at all beneath a deep tipped deposit, probably part of levelling operations in connexion with Aelia Capitolina in the second century A.D. The site, and therefore that of the church to the north, was outside the city till that date.

Work was also continued on two other important sites within the walls of the Old City. One is believed to be that of the establishment of the Legio X Fretensis. The first level reached was, however, that of an important medieval building, probably a bazaar; in consequence the season was spent in clearing a further area before continuing down. An indication of what is to come is given by a fragment of an attractive Byzantine mosaic, and a score of legionary stamps. In the other site, to the south of the Haram esh-Sherif, the level reached is that of a monumental Byzantine complex, probably representing the two hospices which, according to Procopius, were built for sick pilgrims and the indigent poor by Justinian in the sixth century A.D.

14. SYLLOGE OF COINS OF THE BRITISH ISLES.—In July 1964, the Committee's fourth volume, Copenhagen I, dealing with Anglosavan coins up to Edward the Martyr, was published. The volume, edited by Dr. G. Galster, is the first of four covering Anglo-Saxon coins in the Royal Danish Cabinet, and the Committee regard the completion of this important work as a primary responsibility. Dr. Galster has

1964. The Committee has also received completed manuscripts from Edinburgh and from the Ashmolean, where in addition work on a second volume (covering Norman coins to Henry II) is in progress.

15. MEDIEVAL LATIN DICTIONARY.—It is hoped that the Revised Medieval Latin Word-List will be published by the end of 1964. In November 1963 the Council of the Academy reconstituted the Medieval Latin Dictionary Committee, to consist of Dr. R. W. Hunt, Mr. H. C. Johnson (Secretary), Mr. R. E. Latham (Editor), Sir Roger Mynors, and Dr. F. J. E. Raby (Chairman). It is proposed to proceed with the preparation of a Dictionary of British Medieval Latin, to be ready for publication in 1974. Mr. Latham will be employed part-time on the project until May 1967, and from then will give full time to it. It is intended to appoint an Assistant Editor to reorganize the material in standard form, check it where needed ready for the actual drafting, and produce specimen articles. It is also planned to build up a library of working texts where these cannot be obtained on long loan. The Keeper of Public Records has agreed that the Public Record Office shall continue to provide accommodation for the Dictionary.

16. EARLY ENGLISH CHURCH MUSIC.—In addition to the subvention from the British Academy as patron of the project, the grant from the Pilgrim Trust has been renewed, and support is also being given by All Souls College, Oxford, and by the Elmgrant Trust.

The second volume of the series, the Latin Antiphons and Psalms of William Mundy, edited by Dr. F. Ll. Harrison, was published in July 1963, and the third volume, the Verse Anthems of Orlando Gibbons, edited by David Wulstan (Oxford), appeared in June 1964. The following three volumes are in the press: Early Tudor Magnificats, vol. i, edited by Paul Doe (Birmingham); Thomas Tomkins, Musica Deo Sacra, vol. i, edited by Dr. Bernard Rose (Oxford); and Early Tudor Organ Music, vol. i, edited by John Caldwell (Bristol).

The manuscripts of the two subsequent volumes are nearing completion, and arrangements have been made for a further fifteen volumes.

The Committee hopes to be able to sponsor the printing of a Catalogue of English Service Music from the Reformation to the Restoration, which the authors, Dr. Peter le Huray (Cambridge) and Dr. Ralph Daniel (Indiana), expect to complete by the summer of 1964.

- 17. REPERTORY OF THE SOURCES OF MEDIEVAL HISTORY.—Part II, lengthier than Part I (published 1962), is now in the press.
- 18. ENCYCLOPAEDIA OF ISLAM.—During the past year work has continued on Volume II: fascicules 30–34 have been published and fascicule 35 should appear before the end of the year. The preparation of fascicules 36 and 37 is well advanced.

19. ENGLISH PLACE-NAME SOCIETY.—It is expected that the first three volumes of Gloucestershire will be published in July 1964, and the fourth volume will follow in the autumn of 1965. The greater part of Westmorland has now been completed, and this will be followed by Cheshire and Berkshire. Professor K. Cameron hopes to have the Parts of Holland in Lincolnshire ready by 1970, and other Lincolnshire volumes to be prepared will be two further surveys of the Parts of Kesteven and the Parts of Lindsey. As reported last year, work is also proceeding on Dorset and Shropshire.

20. MONUMENTA MUSICAE BYZANTINAE.—During the course of 1963 the firm of E. Munksgaard of Gopenhagen, which has produced the four series Facsimilia, Subsidia, Transcripta, and Lectionaria merged with Blackwell's of Oxford. It is hoped that as a result of this there will be a widened distribution of the Monumenta Musicae Byzantinae, of which several volumes are now out of print. The printing of the facsimile volume of Cod. Saba 83 and of Professor O. Strunk's Specimina notationis antiquioris is progressing satisfactorily. Professor G. Zuntz is preparing the sixth fascicule of the Prophetologium.

N. G. Wilson of Lincoln College, Oxford, and D. Stelanović of the Musicological Institute, Belgrade, have edited for the Bodleian Library publications a catalogue of Manuscripts of Byzantine Chant in Oxford. D. Stelanović is also preparing the publication of the January Stichera

for the Transcripta series.

Mr. Marc Dragoumis from Athens, who for the last two years has been working in Oxford, is preparing a comprehensive study of Late Byzantine and Neo-Greek Chant.

21. THESAURUS LINGUAE LATINAE.—The fund collected through the Academy for this work has now reached a total of £2,635.

22. ARISTOTELES LATINUS.—Volume II. 1–2, De Interpretatione, is in the press. The last proofs of the two translations (by Boethius, edited by L. Minio-Paluello, and by William of Moerbeke, edited by G. Verbeke and revised by L. Minio-Paluello) and their critical apparatus have been corrected; the Appendix, containing specimina of about twenty later Latin versions and supplements to the Latin apparatus, has reached the second proofs; the Index Verborum and Preface will soon be set up.

Volume XI. 1-2, De Mundo (second edition), is also in the press. This volume will contain—apart from the texts mentioned in the previous report—a translation, so far unknown, by Jacopo Sadoleto, and a revised text of Apuleius's paraphrase. The first proofs of the two medieval translations (edited by W. L. Lorimer, revised by L. Minio-Paluello) of Rinucio's version (edited by L. Minio-Paluello) and of Argyropulos's translation (edited by Mrs. G. F. Muscarella) have been

corrected; the specimina of four sixteenth-century translations are

ready to be sent to the press.

A large proportion of the manuscripts of the Liber Sex Principiorum have been examined: the text, based on the collation of the most important among them, has been established. The most important and most ancient manuscripts of Porphyry's Isagoge have also been collated; the text is almost ready. These two works will form volume I. 6–7 (Supplementa Categoriarum, edited by L. Minio-Paluello), and it is hoped to send them to the press in the first part of 1965.

Dr. Gudrun Diem (Cologne) has agreed to undertake the edition of Metaphysica Vetustissima (transl. Iacobi) and Metaphysica Vetus (anonyma). both covering books I-IV. 4, and also of the 'Translatio Nova' (William of Moerbeke), covering the whole work, apart from the Metaphysica Media, on which she had already done much work. She has established the text of the Vetustissima, after extensive examination of all the existing manuscripts and complete collation of the most important ones, and prepared, in a preliminary form, the Latin and Graeco-Latin apparatus. She has also collated test-passages of all the forty manuscripts of the Vetus, and come to final conclusions on the nature of this text, radically revising the views held to this day by scholars who had examined it. She is now establishing the text of the Vetus, on the basis of the more reliable manuscripts. Sir Roger Mynors has undertaken to edit the De Inundatione Nili, and has already collated a number of manuscripts. Dr. Drossaart Lulofs has made some more progress in his work on De Generatione Animalium. Miss I. Arnolt (Leiden) is preparing an edition of De Mirabilibus Auscultationibus. Some additional work has been done by Miss H. Powell on the fifteenth-century editions of Aristotelian Latin texts, and material is being continuously collected for a new volume of supplements to the Codices.

23. CORPUS PLATONICUM.—See p. 23 below, section 27, paragraph 4.

24. CORPUS VITREARUM MEDII AEVI.—Great Britain: The medieval glass in fifty-seven churches in Oxfordshire has been photographed and classified in detail; thirty-seven more churches in the county remain to be investigated. A descriptive catalogue of the glass in churches and colleges is also in hand. Analysis and concordance of the antiquarian sources relating to the glass have been continued and are now in an advanced stage, and much valuable evidence for dating has been found. A considerable amount of time has also been devoted to the iconography of various Biblical scenes and saints in the extant windows of colleges and halls, and also with reference to other examples in English glass and manuscripts. The glass so far catalogued gives a comprehensive picture of changes in style, design, and technique for the period c. 1250–1540, and suggests that the antiquarian sources that have hitherto been published are incomplete, inaccurate, and

misleading. The work has been carried out by Dr. Peter Newton under the direction of Professor Francis Wormald.

For other contributions to the Corpus, see p. 23 below, section 27, paragraph 5.

25. TABULA IMPERII ROMANI.—Progress on the Ancyra-Iconium sheet, which is being prepared by Mr. Michael Ballance, has been slow but steady. As the first Asiatic sheet of the TIR it breaks new ground since there is relatively little previously recorded material. Nevertheless, about two-thirds of the known total of sites have now been recorded from various sources, though a considerable amount of work still remains to be done in Cappadocia.

For other contributions to the TIR, see p. 24 below, section 27,

paragraph 6.

26. PROSOPOGRAPHY OF THE LATER ROMAN EMPIRE.—The project for a Prosopography of the Roman Empire, initiated by Mommsen and the Berlin Academy eighty years ago, was divided into two sections, dealing respectively with the early and the later empire. The first section (Prosopographia Imperii Romani, Saec. I.-III) was completed and published in 1898, but the appearance of the second section was prevented by two world wars. In 1949, however, the work was revived with the support of the British Academy. By the end of 1961 almost all literary, epigraphic, and papyrological sources for the fourth century had been transcribed on index-cards, although gaps remained for the fifth and sixth centuries. It was then decided to start writing the first volume, to cover A.D. 260–395. The year 1962–3 was spent in sorting, classifying, and indexing cards already received, and in excerpting a number of individual sources hitherto omitted.

In 1963-4 a start has been made on composing the individual entries for the first volume, and Mr. J. R. Martindale (full-time assistant secretary) has completed over 300 notices of varying length. The pace has been slow because of the need to combine meticulous accuracy and full relevant information with clarity and economy of presentation.

In addition to the writing of entries, the Fasti and the Indices have been brought up to date, and cross-reference slips of persons with more than one name—in this century the majority—have been completed. Dr. John Morris (Secretary to the Committee) has concentrated on the general problems underlying the study of the more important people, their family connexions, the changing forms of official appointment, &c., and has drafted a number of major entries in provisional form. This section of the work has been rather more than half completed. Professor A. H. M. Jones (Chairman) has supervised and guided the enterprise, commenting, correcting, and amplifying the entries, and deciding practical points of presentation.

It is hoped that the work will be finished and with the printer in two to three years' time. Meanwhile, a technical report, illustrated by a

number of particular examples of historical problems faced, was given to the 1963 Centenary Congress of the Corpus Inscriptionum Latinarum of the Berlin Academy, and will be published in the periodical Klio in 1964.

- 27. UNION ACADÉMIQUE INTERNATIONALE.—The 37th Annual Meeting was held in Vienna, 13–18 June 1963. The Academy's representatives were Sir Roger Mynors and Mr. C. H. Roberts. The following matters in which the Academy has a direct interest are summarized from the *Report* of the Conference.
- I. CORPUS VASORUM ANTIQUORUM.—During the previous year the following fascicules had appeared: Germany: Berlin 2 and 3, by A. Greifenhagen. Italy: Taranto, Museo Nazionale 3, by C. Drago; Rome, Musei Capitolini 1, by G. Q. Giglioli and V. Bianco; Ferrara, Museo Archeologico 1, by Arias. Poland: Warsaw 5, by Mlle M. L. Bernhard. Switzerland: Geneva 1, by Mlle Brückner. The following fascicules were in the press or in preparation: Germany: Leipzig 2, by Eberhard Paul (black-figure vases, oinochoai, cups and other forms); Heidelberg 2, by Margot Schmidt; Stuttgart, by Erika Kunze-Götte; Frankfurt 1, by Kurt Depper: Heidelberg 3, by Fulvio Canciani; Munich 6, by Hélène Karidi: Hanover, by Dietrich Schultz. Austria: Vienna, Kunsthistorisches Museum 3, by M. F. Eichler (Attic red-figure kraters). Spain: Barcelona 2, by J. de C. Serra i Ràfols (Iberian vases); Barcelona 3, by Mme Trias d'Arribas (Greek pottery not found at Emporiae). United States: New York, Metropolitan Museum 3, by D. von Bothmer (Attic black-figure amphorae); Boston, by Hoffman (black-figure vases); Seattle, Washington, Portland, by D. A. Amyx; Los Angeles, by P. Clement: Cleveland and Toledo, by C. Boulter. France: Louvre 13 and 14 (index to the six preceding fascicules), by F. Villard; Louvre 15, by L. Kahil (Attic lekythoi). Hungary: Budapest 1, by J. Gy. Szilágyi. Italy: Rome, Musei Capitolini 2, by G. Q. Giglioli and V. Bianco; Milan, Musei Civici 2, by G. Belloni; Gela, Museo Archeologico, by Orlandini and Varri. Norway: Museums and other collections, by Seeberg (Italianate vases and prehistoric fragments). Poland: Warsaw 6 and 7, by Mlle M. L. Bernhard. Rumania: Bucharest, National Museum 1. Bucharest (other collections) and other towns. Sweden: Fascicule 1. Switzerland: Geneva 2, by C. Dunand and L. Kahil; Berne 1. Yugoslavia: A fascicule was in preparation. Cyprus had applied for membership of the U.A.I. in order that a Cyprus fascicule might be prepared and published. It was agreed that a section on Cyprus should be included, but membership of the U.A.I. was not granted.
- 2. CORPUS OF GREEK AND LATIN INSCRIPTIONS.—Spain: Preparation of the CIL for the Iberian peninsula was continuing. Hungary: Volume III (originally prepared by the Berlin Academy) was being re-edited by a committee of seven scholars. Work on the project had started in 1957, and should be finished by autumn 1964. Haly: Volume XII, Fasti Anni

Juliani, would appear shortly, and work was in progress on the Tarentum and Aquileia fascicules. An edition of the Greek inscriptions at Rome was being undertaken by Luigi Moretti. *Tugoslavia: The committee, set up in 1961, was preparing a new series of classical inscriptions, and several volumes would be ready by the end of 1963. Work on the Yugoslav inscriptions for the CIL of the Berlin Academy was almost finished. *Rumania: Work on inscriptions for the Berlin CIL was nearly completed. The fascicules for Istros, Capidava, and Noviodunum for the national Corpus were already drafted and work on Scythia Minor and Tomis was approaching completion. The texts would not, however, be printed until the fascicules for Dobrudja and Dacia were ready.

- 3. ARISTOTELES LATINUS.—See p. 19 above, section 22.
- 4. CORPUS PLATONICUM.—With the appearance of Volume IV of the Plato Latinus, the Timaeus with Commentary by Calcidius, edited by J. H. Waszink, all known medieval Latin translations of Plato's works had been made accessible, either in full or (as in the case of the Meno and the Phaedo, translated by Henricus Aristippus, the Parmenides, translated by William of Moerbeke, and the Timaeus) almost in full. Work had been carried out on the question of the Greek manuscript used by Cicero for his translation (fragmentary) of the Timaeus. Research in German and Italian libraries had resulted in the discovery of several other manuscripts containing translations by Calcidius and Cicero of the Timaeus: these were to be added to the catalogue. A list of manuscripts containing the different versions of the Commentary of William of Conches-either in full, or fragmentary-had been drawn up. A new examination of the manuscript of the first complete translation of the Parmenides to be discovered, annotated by Nicolas of Cusa, had been in progress, in order to establish whether or not it had been written out by the translator (George of Trebizond) himself. Work had been carried out by Mlle L. Labowsky on the catalogue of books in the library of Cardinal Bessarion. Marginal notes made by Nicolas of Cusa in his copies of the works of Plato were in the press.
- 5. CORPUS VITREARUM MEDII AEVI.—Great Britain: see p. 20 above, section 24. The following volumes were in preparation: Germany: Volumes for the Rhineland (IV), Cologne Cathedral (V), Swabia 1350–1480 (II), Baden, Hesse, and Westphalia (III and VI), Erfurt and Mühlhausen (VII), Nuremburg 1300–1520 (X), Franken1300–1520 (XI), Regensberg-Oberpfalz(XIII). Austria: Lower Austria (II). Belgium: Fifteenth-century stained glass of Belgium (II). Spain: Medieval glass of Catalonia and Aragon (I). United States: Medieval stained glass in the United States of America (I). France: Saint-Ouen and Rouen (XXV), Strasbourg Cathedral and the Musée de l'Œuvre (VIII), Limousin and Poitou (XVII), Languedoc and Guyenne (XV and XVI), Paris and environs (II), Seine-Maritime (XXV), Chartres (XX), Lower Rhine (VIII). Italy: Tuscany (III). Poland: Cracow and Torun (I). Portugal: Medieval

stained glass of Portugal. Sweden: Medieval stained glass of Scandinavia. Switzerland: Fourteenth to fifteenth-century Swiss stained glass (III), Königsfelden (II), Bern Cathedral (IV). Czechoslovakia: Medieval stained glass of the Czechoslovakian Republic.

6. TABULA IMPERII ROMANI.—Great Britain: see above, p. 21, section 25. Austria: The bibliography relating to the Mediolanum and Prague sheets had been brought up to date in 1962. Hungary: A meeting of delegates from Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Hungary, and Rumania had been held in Budapest in June 1963 to discuss the publication (in 1965) of the Aquincum sheet. Italy: Work was progressing on the Mediolanum sheet. At a meeting which took place in Ljubljana in 1962, the various countries taking part in the project had discussed the Aquincum and Naissus sheets. Switzerland: The Swiss section of the Mediolanum sheet was in preparation; it was to be published with a subvention from the Swiss National Fund. Yugoslavia: A study was being made of the Roman Limes. There were in preparation three volumes on the Clausura occidentalis, the first of which was to be published before the end of the year.

7. CODICES LATINI ANTIQUIORES.—Volume X, containing manuscripts in the libraries of Austria, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Egypt, and Holland had been published in May 1963. Preparation of Volume XI, dealing with Hungary, Poland, Spain, Sweden, the U.S.A., the

U.S.S.R., and Yugoslavia was progressing favourably.

Volume III of the Chartae Latinae Antiquiores, dealing with Latin non-literary papyri and parchments earlier than A.D. 800 in the British Museum, was to be published in due course. It would contain nineteen papyri of the first to sixth centuries, three papyri from Ravenna of the sixth and seventh centuries, and twenty-two Anglo-Saxon Charters of the seventh and eighth centuries. Volume IV, containing documents found in England, Scotland, Ireland, Scandinavia, Belgium, and the Netherlands would be published in 1964.
