1. DEATHS AND ELECTIONS OF FELLOWS.—The Academy has lost eight Ordinary Fellows by death during the year: Sir Cyril Flower, Mr. Charles Johnson, Professor D. S. Robertson, Professor H. J. Rose, Professor D. Nichol Smith, Professor R. H. Tawney, Dr. E. M. W. Tillyard, and Sir Charles Webster.

Senator Professor Luigi Einaudi, Honorary Fellow of the Academy, died during the year, and the deaths of the following Corresponding Fellows were also reported: Professor Werner Jaeger and Professor Pietro Toesca.

In July 1961 the following were elected to Ordinary Fellowship: the Reverend Professor C. K. Barrett, Dr. T. S. R. Boase, Professor John Brough, Professor J. E. Butt, Professor A. K. Cairncross, Professor J. D. Clark, Dr. R. W. Hunt, Mr. Russell Meiggs, and Miss Margery Perham.

The total number of Fellows before the election in July 1962 was 233 Ordinary Fellows (including 40 Senior Fellows and 2 Fellows elected under Supplemental Charter), 68 Corresponding Fellows, and 3 Honorary Fellows.

9. BEQUEST BY THE LATE SIR CHARLES WEBSTER.—The Academy has been named as the residuary legatee under the will of the late Sir Charles Webster; the fund when available to be used for hospitality at home and for fuller representation abroad.

10. ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION COMMITTEE FOR A SURVEY OF THE PROVISION FOR RESEARCH IN THE HUMANITIES AND THE SOCIAL SCIENCES.—The *Report* of this Committee has been submitted to H.M. Government and negotiations are proceeding.

11. PROVISION FOR RESEARCH.—Pending a more permanent arrangement for the subvention of research, the following grants have been welcomed by the Council of the Academy:

1. Two Thousand Pounds from King's College, Cambridge, to assist research.
2. Two Thousand Pounds per annum for three years from the Pilgrim Trust for a similar purpose. This grant resumes the provision made by the Pilgrim Trust for research in 1955-60.

12. CORPUS VITREARUM MEDII AEVI.—In 1957 the Pilgrim Trust made a grant of £1,650 towards the preparation of a pilot British volume within the scope of this international enterprise. The Trust has now enlarged this benefaction by a further £1,000 p.a. for the years 1963-4 and 1964-5, in order to enable the project to be carried to a satisfactory conclusion; and the *Corpus Vitrearum* Committee of the Academy, under the Chairmanship of Professor Francis Wormald, has made suitable arrangements.

13. BRITISH INSTITUTE OF PERSIAN STUDIES.—The formal opening of the British Institute of Persian Studies in Tehran was attended by the President and the Secretary, with Professor M. E. L. Mallowan as President of the Institute's Governing Council. The visitors spent some days in the capital, and Sir Maurice Bowra delivered an inaugural lecture on Edward Fitzgerald, with the Rector of the University of Tehran in the Chair. The visitors also travelled to the site of the early Achaemenid capital at Pasargadae, to see the excavations which had been successfully begun there by the Institute's Director, Mr. David Stronach, with the aid of a number of students.

14. **ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND HISTORICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR COLONIAL TERRITORIES.**—This Committee has now been transferred from the Colonial Office to the new Department of Technical Co-operation, with the name of Archaeological and Historical Advisory Committee for Overseas Co-operation. In this new guise the Committee will continue to cover its old commitments, but may also be consulted in a wider field.

15. **EARLY ENGLISH CHURCH MUSIC.**—It is proposed to issue through Messrs. Stainer and Bell a series of publications relating to English church music up to c. 1640. The aim of the project is to make available church music by British composers of the Middle Ages and the Renaissance in a form designed to serve both scholarly and practical needs. The scheme has been rendered possible by a substantive grant and a loan from the Pilgrim Trust.

The series is intended to complete the publication in modern editions of all early sacred music in Britain. It will include music down to the fifteenth century, unpublished Masses and other liturgical works of the early sixteenth century, and anthems, services, and motets of post-Reformation times by Elizabethan, Jacobean, and Caroline composers. It will also provide new editions of music which has long been out of print. It is not intended to duplicate available complete and scholarly publications nor those proposed for already existing series. The volumes planned for publication in the first year are: I and II, *Early Tudor Masses*, edited by J. D. Bergsagel (in the press); III, *William Mundy, Latin Works*, edited by F. Ll. Harrison (in preparation). Subsequent volumes will include fifteenth-century antiphons and Mass music, early Tudor antiphons, Magnificats and liturgical organ music; the sacred works of John Sheppard, Robert Parsons, A. Ferrabosco I and II, John Ward, William Child, William and Henry Lawes, and the sacred works in Thomas Myriell's Jacobean anthology; and the anthems of Thomas Tomkins.

The project is under the patronage of the Academy and is administered by the following Committee, under the chairmanship of Sir Jack Westrup: The Rev. Professor Henry Chadwick, Professor E. H. J. Gombich, Professor Anthony Lewis, Dr. Frank Ll. Harrison (General Editor), and Dr. John D. Bergsagel (Executive Editor).

16. **MEDIEVAL LATIN DICTIONARY COMMITTEE.**—The Committee records with great regret the death of Mr. Charles Johnson, who, more than any other single person, has given inspiration and direction to its work and brought it to the point at which the preparation of a full-scale dictionary is immediately feasible. His interest in the project was engaged at the time of Mr. R. J. Whitwell's proposals in 1913 and he was active in forwarding the revived scheme in 1920. From the formation of the Committee in 1924 he was one of the joint-secretaries until 1934, since when he has acted as treasurer. As secretary

of the Committee concerned with post-Conquest materials, he was editor of that part of the work and gave invaluable assistance as adviser and critic to readers engaged on ill-edited texts and original manuscripts. His own contribution as a reader was extensive and covered a very wide range of technical subjects, which otherwise would have been only lightly touched. In co-operation with the Rev. Professor J. H. Baxter, who was responsible for work on pre-Conquest materials, he edited the *Medieval Latin Word-List*, first published in 1934, and he shared with Professor Baxter and Professor J. F. Willard the compilation of the pioneer *Index of British and Latin Writers, 400-1520*, published in the *Bulletin du Cange* in 1932.

The complete manuscript of the *Revised Medieval Latin Word-List* is now with the printers.

The typescript of the fascicule MIL-MIZ of the *Novum Glossarium*, published by the International Committee, has been received from the editor, Professor Blatt, and corrections have been made to the citations from British sources.

17. JERUSALEM EXCAVATIONS.—The Academy has collaborated with the British School of Archaeology in Jerusalem and the École Biblique de S. Étienne in the investigation of the earlier cities of Jerusalem lying to the south of the medieval walls of the present Old City. The results of the first season's work have materially changed the structural history of the city; for example, the walls hitherto believed to be those of the earliest Jerusalem on the ridge above the Kidron Valley are found to be no older than the Maccabean period, of the second century B.C. On the slopes below this fortification others of earlier period have been brought to light, and work is now proceeding far down the slope upon a wall which goes back to about 1800 B.C. The excavations have thus already extended the area of the earliest Jerusalem—Canaanite—Jebusite and Davidic—by many acres.

At the same time excavations have been carried out within the Old City to determine the line of the North Wall of the time of the Crucifixion, and so to assess the authenticity of the traditional site of Calvary and the Holy Sepulchre.

18. THESAURUS LINGUAE LATINAE.—The fund collected through the Academy for this work now amounts to £2,520.

19. ENCYCLOPAEDIA OF ISLAM.—During the year fascicules 24-27 of volume II have been issued, and it is hoped that four more will appear in 1962-3. Fascicules 28 and 29 are already in proof.

20. REPERTORY OF THE SOURCES OF MEDIEVAL HISTORY.—Part I, *Series Collectionum* has been published, and work is continuing on Part II.

21. ENGLISH PLACE-NAME SOCIETY.—This year seven volumes of the *Place-Names of the West Riding of Yorkshire* have been issued, and an eighth, the index volume for the whole of Yorkshire, is now in the press. The three or four volumes on *Gloucestershire* have been completed and are going to press in June of this year. The surveys of both *Cheshire* and *Berkshire* are nearing completion, and a considerable start has been made with the survey of *Westmorland*. The Society has received the material that the late Dr. F. T. Wainwright collected for *Leicestershire*, and it is expected that this will receive early attention.

A Council of Name Studies of Great Britain and Ireland has been formed to arrange co-operation between the various surveys that are being made of place-names in England, Scotland, Wales, and Ireland, and this is already making possible a profitable association in the studies of Germanic and Celtic place-names and personal names in this region.

22. MONUMENTA MUSICAE BYZANTINAE.—In June 1961 the Royal Danish Academy appointed as *Directeur de l'entreprise* Professor Oliver Strunk (Princeton) in succession to the late Professor Carsten Høeg. During the last two years Professor Strunk had spent most of his time in Copenhagen carrying on in collaboration with Professor Høeg's assistants the work initiated by the founder of the *M.M.B.* The 11th International Congress of Byzantine Studies in Ochrid (Jugoslavia) gave the editors of the *M.M.B.* the welcome opportunity of widening the scope of their work in collaboration with Yugoslav scholars who are studying Old Slavonic chant. The Editorial Board is now preparing the following volumes:

- (ii) *Canti ecclesiastici della tradizione italo-albanese*, 2 vols., by Dom Bartolomeo di Salvo (Grottaferrata).
- (iii) *Specimina Notationis Antiquioris*, edited by O. Strunk (Princeton).
- (iv) *Studies on the Fragmenta Chilandarica Palaeoslavica*, ii, edited by Roman Jacobson (Harvard).
- (v) *The Tradition of the Sticherarion*, by D. Stefanović (Belgrade).
- (vi) *Facsimile Edition of the Hirmologion Saba 83*, edited by J. Raasted (Copenhagen).
- (vii) *Facsimile Edition of the Sticherarion Vatopedi 1488*, by O. Strunk (Princeton).

In 1958 the Editorial Board undertook to prepare as a part of the *Répertoire International des Sources Musicales* a catalogue of manuscripts of Byzantine music. The first two fascicules, with descriptions of the manuscripts at St. Catherine's Monastery, Mount Sinai, and of the manuscripts at Grottaferrata and Messina, should go to press before the end of 1962.

The forthcoming issue of the Danish periodical *Classica et Mediaevalia*, under the general heading *Nova e Monumentis Musicae Byzantinae*, will print brief communications by Levy, Raasted, and Strunk.

The second revised and enlarged edition of *A History of Byzantine Music and Hymnography* by E. Wellesz (Oxford), one of the editors of the *M.M.B.*, was published in October 1961, and a reprint is now with the printer.

23. ARISTOTELES LATINUS.—Volume I. 1–5 in the series of texts, containing all the ancient and medieval translations of the *Categories*, was published in September 1961. Volume XXIX. 1, containing the first, partial, translation of the *Politics* was published in November 1961. The supplementary volume of descriptions of Latin Aristotelian manuscripts is now being bound and will be published very shortly. Volume III. 1–4, containing all the translations of the *Prior Analytics* and an ample collection of scholia translated from the Greek, is in the press; the first proofs of half the volume have been corrected and it is hoped that the volume will appear towards the end of 1962.

Work in progress includes: volumes II. 1–2 (*De Interpretatione*), XVII. 3 (*Historia Animalium*), and XXVI. 1–2 (*Ethica Nicomachea*). It is hoped that volume II. 1–2 will go to press in the course of the present summer. Work is also being begun on a survey of the printed editions of the ancient and medieval translations of Aristotle's writings.

The contributions from the Union Académique Internationale, the Jowett Copyright Trustees, the Unione Accademica Italiana, and the British Academy, have met a large proportion of the expenses incurred for the publication of volumes I. 1–5 and XXIX. 1, and of *Codices, Supplementa*. A limited amount of photographic and travelling expenses has also been made possible by the contribution of the Union Académique Internationale. A grant from the same source—to which a supplementary grant has been added now by the Craven Committee—has made it possible to obtain the help and collaboration of an Oxford post-graduate, Miss Helen Powell.

24. SYLLOGE OF COINS OF THE BRITISH ISLES.—D. F. Allen's *Coins of the Coritani* is in its first-proof stages. Meanwhile, work on the first volume of the *Copenhagen Anglo-Saxon Collection* has been progressing, so that both manuscript and plates should be ready for the printers as soon as the work on the *Coritani* has been published. These will be followed by the first *Chester Museum* volume, devoted to coins from the Chester mint; manuscript and plates should be ready before the end of the year. The first *Edinburgh Museum* volume is also in an advanced stage, and a beginning has been made on five others. An important development has been the inauguration of a *British Museum Sylloge* series, identical in binding, format, layout, and intention with the British Academy series. The British Museum takes over from

the Academy Committee the Hiberno-Norse volume, which is virtually ready, and the Charles I volume.

25. TABULA IMPERII ROMANI.—Good progress has been made with the preparation of the *Ancyra-Iconium* sheet of the *Tabula Imperii Romani*. Contributions from several outlying areas are still awaited, but well over half of the sheet, comprising the whole central area, is now in first draft, together with the material for the indexes. In August 1961 Mr. M. H. Ballance, who is editing the sheet on behalf of a joint committee of the British School at Rome and the British Institute of Archaeology at Ankara, spent a month in Cappadocia, where he succeeded in identifying three new towns and a number of roads, eliminating one of the worst blank areas on the map.

26. UNION ACADÉMIQUE INTERNATIONALE.—The 35th Annual Meeting was held in Stockholm, 12-17 June 1961. The Academy's representatives were the President and Professor R. A. B. Mynors. The following matters in which the Academy has a direct interest are summarized from the *Report of the Conference*.

1. CORPUS VASORUM ANTIQUORUM.—During the previous year the following fascicules had appeared: Germany: *Altenburg, Staatl. Lindenau-Museum*, 3, by E. Bielefeld; *Berlin*, 2, by A. Greifenhagen. Italy: *Turin, Museo archeologico*, 1, by F. lo Porto; *Bologna, Museo civico*, 5, by G. Bermond Montanari. Poland: *Warsaw, National Museum*, 3, by M. L. Bernhard.

The following fascicules were in preparation or were projected: Austria: *Vienna: Kunsthst. Museum*, 3, by F. Eichler (Attic red-figure kraters, supplement to fasc. 1-2). France: *Laon*, 1, by J. de la Genière (in the press); *Louvre*, 13 (Corinthian vases), by F. Villard, 14 (Index to fasc. 8-13), by F. Villard, and 15 (red-figure lekythoi), by L. G. Kahil. Germany: *Gotha*, 1 and 2, by E. Rohde; *Leipzig*, 2 (Attic black-figure vases). Hungary: *Budapest, Musée des Beaux Arts*, 1 and 2, by J. Gy. Szilagyí. Italy: *Verona, Museo civico*, 1, by G. Riccioni (in the press); *Taranto, Museo archeologico*, 3, by C. Drago; *Milan, Museo civico*, 2, by G. Belloni. Norway: a fascicule of Bronze Age Greek vases and fragments. Poland: *Warsaw, Musée national*, 5 and 6, by M. L. Bernhard. Rumania: *Bucharest*, 1, by Suzana Dimitriu and Petre Alexandrescu. Sweden: *Stockholm, Medelhavsmuseet*, 1. Switzerland: *Geneva, Musée d'Art et d'Histoire*, 1, by Mlle Brückner.

2. TABULA IMPERII ROMANI.—Austria and Italy: The sheet for *Ter-geste* had been published. The sheet for *Mediolanum* would be published in collaboration with Switzerland and printed in Italy. As to Rumania, it was announced that the sheet for *Dacia Inferior* was now ready, and work was proceeding on *Scythia Minor*. For Holland it was announced that the sheet for *Amsterdam* would be ready in 1962. The sheet including

Paris and part of Belgium would be published by France; whilst that relating to south-eastern England and France, under the name of *London*, would, it was hoped, be published by England. Spain expected to transmit to France the materials in Catalonia for inclusion in the map of the *Eastern Pyrenees*, already completed by France. For Yugoslavia it was reported that *Serdica* (eastern half of Yugoslavia) was in preparation, but since parts of Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria were to be included the work was expected to take a considerable time. See also p. 11.

3. CORPUS PHILOSOPHORUM MEDII AEVI.—*Corpus Platonicum*.—The edition of *Calcidius* was rapidly advancing towards publication and the *Index Locorum* was expected to appear in 1962. Forty-six manuscripts, complete or fragmentary, of *Calcidius* had been discovered during the year in libraries which have been insufficiently catalogued. For *Aristoteles Latinus*, see p. 10.

4. CODICES LATINI ANTIQUIORES.—The next fascicule, volume X, containing manuscripts in the libraries of Austria, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Egypt and Holland, was expected to appear by the end of 1961. The preparation of the next volume was already advanced; it would deal with Hungary, Poland, Spain, the U.S.A., the U.S.S.R., and Yugoslavia. Much help had been received from Mr. J. S. G. Simons of Oxford, Professor B. Bischoff of Munich, and Dr. James J. John (Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton).

5. CORPUS VITREARUM MEDII AEVI.—For the British contribution, see p. 6. Austria: The publication of Volume I relating to the medieval glass of *Vienna* had experienced technical delays but was expected to be ready shortly. A grant had been obtained from the Ministry of Public Instruction towards the cost of preparing Volume II on the medieval glass of *Lower Austria*. Belgium: Volume I, dealing with the glass preserved in *Belgium*, 1200–1500, by Jean Helbig, was expected to be ready by the end of 1961. France: Volume XXV, 2, dealing with the glass of *St. Ouen, Rouen*, by Jean Lafond, was in active preparation. Volume VIII, 1, dealing with the glass of *Strasbourg Cathedral*, by Victor Beyer, was also in progress and completion was expected in 1962. Germany: The second part of volume II, dealing with *Swabia, 1350–1480*, had been delayed, but about half the material had been studied and drawings and colour-photographs prepared. Volume IV, relating to the *Rhineland*, and volume V, dealing with *Cologne Cathedral*, were still in preparation. Volume X, relating to *Nuremberg*, was also in an advanced stage. Poland: Volume I, by Lech Kalinowski and Hanna Pienkowska, cataloguing all the glass preserved in the *Museums of Poland*, was in an advanced stage of preparation. U.S.A.: A grant from the American Council of Learned Societies had enabled Miss Jane Hayward to travel in Europe for the purpose of identifying the origins of ancient glass preserved in America. The journey had been widely

successful and publication under the direction of Professor Sumner Crosby of Yale was expected, without date.

During the year a special effort had been made by the International Secretary of the enterprise, Mr. Hahnloser, to stimulate progress in the initial stages of the project by visiting and conferring with leaders of it in Belgium, Finland, Great Britain, Italy, Norway, Sweden, and the U.S.A., with a special view to ensuring a suitable measure of collaboration. In several countries with active scholars, the present and pressing problem is that of funds.

6. CORPUS OF GREEK AND LATIN INSCRIPTIONS.—Great Britain: It was announced that two Supplements, dealing with *Inscriptions on Stone*, had been completed and were expected to go to press in 1962. Italy: It was announced that a large volume, prepared by M. Degrassi, was in the press and was expected to appear in 1962; it would be the twelfth volume of the Italian series and would comprise the *Calendaria*. Spain: Considerable progress had been made in the preparation of the *Catalan Supplement*. Yugoslavia: It was announced that the volume of *Latin Inscriptions found in Jugoslavia between 1941 and 1949* would be published shortly, together with an Index for *Antike Inschriften*, volume I.
