1. DEATHS AND ELECTIONS OF FELLOWS.—The Academy has lost seven Ordinary Fellows by death during the year: Professor N. H. Baynes, Sir William Calder, Dr. Helen Darbishire, Dr. H. W. Garrod, Sir Lewis Namier, the Very Reverend Norman Sykes, and the Marquess of Zetland.

During the same period five Corresponding Fellows have died: Professor F. Chabod, Professor C. Høeg, Professor W. Koehler, Professor Wilhelm Schubart, and the Reverend L. Hugues Vincent.

10. BRITISH INSTITUTE OF PERSIAN STUDIES IN TEHRAN.—Following upon the experimental appointment by the Academy of an Archaeological Attaché to the British Council in Iran for 1960-1, the President and the Secretary went to Tehran in December 1960 to explore the possibilities of further development. In consequence, and with continuing help from the British Council, the Academy has been

able to establish a British Institute of Persian Studies in Tehran as from 1 April 1961. The project received every encouragement in Iran, both from the Shah himself and from his ministers, and on the initiative of the Rector of the University of Tehran quarters for the Institute have been provided free of charge for two years by the University. The quarters were formally handed over at the time of the visit of the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh in March and both Her Majesty and the Duke acknowledged the generosity of the gift. The proposal to establish the Institute was supported by the Foreign Office, and H.M. Treasury has included an allocation of £8,000 in the budget for 1961-2 under this head.

More explicitly than in the other British Schools and Institutes abroad, the new Institute of Persian Studies is designed to comprise the whole range of Persian culture including archaeology, art, history, literature, and language. Furthermore, the University of Tehran is anxious that from time to time, as opportunity offers, the Institute shall take some part in the research-work of Persian students there, particularly but not exclusively in the transmission of western archaeological techniques.

Professor Mallowan is President and Professor Arberry Vice-President of the Council.

Mr. David Stronach, M.A., who has had a considerable experience of archaeological work in Iran, Iraq, Anatolia, and Pakistan, has been appointed the first Director.

The Wolfson Foundation has generously provided £10,000 for the purpose of establishing studentships during the first five years of the Institute's work.

11. SALVAGE OF NUBIAN ANTIQUITIES.—In May 1960 the Minister of Education set up a British Nubian Committee to co-operate with UNESCO in the task of salvaging archaeological and historical information threatened by the new High Dam at Aswan. The terms of reference also included the removal of certain structures beyond the flood level and the conservation of certain others within the threatened area. The President of the Committee was the Duke of Devonshire and its Chairman Sir Mortimer Wheeler.

The Committee gave priority to survey and selective excavation within the threatened area under the direction of Professor W. B. Emery, working through the Egypt Exploration Society. It approached H.M. Treasury for a special grant of £20,000 to cover this work in the years 1960-2 and was successful in its application. The grant is dispensed through the Academy. Work began in the field in November 1960 and will be continued seasonally throughout the projected period.

12. THE DEAD SEA SCROLLS.—An *ad hoc* Committee was set up by the Academy to consider ways and means of securing those Scrolls which are known, or were recently known, to be in Arab hands. The Committee also reviewed the whole question of the Scrolls in a wider context. The situation has been complicated by the changing attitude of the Jordanian Government and by other administrative difficulties, but negotiation is proceeding in close consultation with H.M. Treasury and the Foreign Office.

13. THE SARAH TRYPHENA PHILLIPS LECTURE IN AMERICAN LITERATURE AND HISTORY.—On the initiative of Professor Carl Bode, lately Cultural Attaché at the United States Embassy in London, the Ellis L. Phillips Foundation of America has endowed a biennial Lectureship in American Literature and History. The first lecture was given in April 1961 by Professor Bode on *The Sound of American Literature a Century Ago*.

14. RATING OF LEARNED SOCIETIES.—Since the passing of the Scientific Societies Act 1843, learned societies have been exempt from rates. In 1959 a report to Government of the Committee on the Rating of Charities and Kindred Bodies (known as the 'Pritchard Report') recommended the repeal of this Act and the inclusion of learned societies within the terms of a new Act whereby they should be rated at 50 per cent. of their full assessment, with such further relaxation as might be conceded to them by the local authority. This Act passed its third reading in the House of Commons in May 1961.

The total sum involved after the exemption of the 50 per cent. rate, although not large in relation to national finance, is likely to be a serious new commitment to the individual societies concerned. In an attempt to secure more favourable terms before the Act was passed,

a Joint Committee of the Royal Society and the British Academy was formed to consider the matter and to approach the Minister for Science and the Treasury. This was done and the case for the learned societies was argued at some length both by letter and by a joint delegation of the two bodies. The following statement was subsequently made in the House of Commons (10 May 1961):

The Minister for Science and the Financial Secretary to the Treasury had had an opportunity to discuss the situation of the national learned societies with a deputation from the Royal Society and the British Academy speaking on their behalf. It was generally considered that the needs of these societies should be considered outside the framework of the Bill. It was agreed that after the Bill became law there should be a joint review of the finances of the learned societies of national importance, taking into account, among other things, any new liability for rates.

The learned societies must now wait until the effects of the Bill can be accurately assessed. Thereafter there will be a joint review by the Royal Society and the Academy of the finances of the learned societies of national importance, taking into account (among other things) the new liability for modified rates less such additional relief as may be secured from the rating authorities under the discretionary powers allowed them in the Bill. The Treasury may then be approached with a view to obtaining some special provision from national sources in hard cases.

15. ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION COMMITTEE FOR A SURVEY OF THE PROVISION FOR RESEARCH IN THE HUMANITIES AND THE SOCIAL SCIENCES.—The Committee appointed in 1957–8 to carry out a survey of the existing provision for research in the Humanities and the Social Sciences in the United Kingdom has held two further meetings in London, making 18 in all. In addition three meetings of an Editorial Sub-Committee have been held in Oxford. The main work in 1960–1 was concerned with the final revision of drafts of sections of the report and with the framing of a series of important recommendations. All these, with appendixes (which include records of the investigations made abroad) were finally approved in galley form at the Committee's eighteenth meeting on 9 February, and were accepted, with minor amendments, by the Council of the Academy on 15 February, when it was decided to arrange for publication in September 1961.

The thanks of the Academy are again expressed to the Officers of the Rockefeller Foundation who generously extended the period over which the grant was available until 31 December 1961.

16. CORPUS OF CYPRIOT INSCRIPTIONS.—The Academy proposes to publish a *Corpus of Cypriot Inscriptions* ranging from the earliest period down to the Byzantine age in a series of periodical

volumes. The editor will be Mr. Terence Mitford, who has already done much work in this field; and the *Corpus* will run to an approximate total of five volumes. It should be of wide use linguistically and historically, and will incidentally be a fitting memorial to British scholarship in the island.

17. REPERTORY OF THE SOURCES OF MEDIEVAL HISTORY.—Part I of the Repertory is complete and has been passed for printing. Work proceeds with Part II.

18. MEDIEVAL LATIN DICTIONARY.—Satisfactory progress is being made with the printing of the *Revised Word-List*, though it is unlikely to be ready for publication before 1962. The volume should amount to about 400 pages, approximately twice the size of the original edition.

When the *Word-List* is issued the task of the Medieval Latin Dictionary Committee will have been completed. A proposal is under consideration for the appointment of a new committee for the preparation of a *Dictionary of British and Irish Medieval Latin*. It will in any event be necessary to have some continuing organisation to fulfil British commitments to the International Committee in respect of the *Novum Glossarium*.

19. SYLLOGE OF COINS OF THE BRITISH ISLES.—The committee's second publication, covering the Anglo-Saxon coins in the Hunter and Coats collections at Glasgow, and edited by Anne S. Robertson, has been issued. For 1961-2 two smaller volumes are envisaged, both based on coins in the British Museum and containing pioneer studies by D. F. Allen (*Coins of the Coritani*) and R. H. M. Dolley (*Hiberno-Norse Coins*). By the end of this year the committee expects to be dealing with the first of the Copenhagen volumes on Anglo-Saxon coins and the first of two volumes covering the collection at the Grosvenor Museum, Chester. The first Chester volume will be devoted entirely to coins from the local mint. It is hoped to provide some assistance for Dr. J. P. C. Kent in the coming year to help forward the first of the seventeenth-century volumes. Work at the Ashmolean is progressing on two Ancient British and Anglo-Saxon volumes and on another based on the Hird Collection of Scottish coins.

20. MONUMENTA MUSICAE BYZANTINAE.—This project has suffered a serious loss in the death of Professor Carsten Høeg on 4 April 1961. During the past and present year, however, the output of the Committee has exceeded its previous achievements; it includes: H. J. W. Tillyard's transcription of the *Pentecostarium*; Dr. Miloš Velimirović's two volumes on *Old Slavonic Chant*; and a facsimile edition of the

Contacarium Mosquense. The following works will also soon be ready: *Cod. Saba 83*, photographed at S. Saba, Jerusalem, in colour by the Royal Danish Academy; *Vatopedi-Triodion* by Professor Oliver Strunk; and a study by Dmitrij Stefanović of the *Hymns for January*. It is reported that an increasing number of University Music Departments have introduced the study of Byzantine Music.

21. ENCYCLOPAEDIA OF ISLAM.—During the year publication has been maintained by the completion of volume I in twenty-two fascicules and the beginning of volume II. It is anticipated that this satisfactory rate of publication will be maintained.

22. CRITICAL EDITION OF THE GREEK NEW TESTAMENT.—The material for the *Luke* volume is in an advanced stage of preparation, but work has been somewhat delayed by the indisposition of the Secretary of the Committee, Professor G. D. Kilpatrick.

23. THESAURUS LINGVAE LATINAE.—The fund collected through the Academy for this work now amounts to £2,425.

24. UNION ACADÉMIQUE INTERNATIONALE.—The 34th Annual Meeting was held at Brussels, 13–17 June 1960. The Academy's representatives were Professor R. A. B. Mynors and Dr. L. Minio-Paluello. The following matters in which the Academy has a direct interest are summarised from the *Report* of the Conference.

I. CORPUS VASORUM ANTIQUORUM.—During the previous twelve months the following fascicules had appeared: *Austria*: Vienna, Kunsthistorisches Museum 2, by F. Eichler. *Germany*: Altenburg, Staatl. The following fascicules were in preparation or were projected: *Austria*: Vienna, Kunsthistorisches Museum 3. *France*: Laon 1, by J. de la Genière (black- and red-figure vases); Louvre 13, by L. G. Kahil (red-figure lekythoi); Louvre 14 (Corinthian-style vases), by F. Villard. *Germany*: Altenburg, Staatl. Lindenau-Museum 3, by E. Bielefeld; Berlin 2, by A. Greifenhagen (Attic red-figure cups in West Berlin); Munich 5, by R. Lullies; Gotha 1–2; Leipzig 2, Mozrenz. *Italy*: Bologna, Museo civico 5, by G. Bermond-Montanari; Milan, Museo civico 2, by G. Belloni; Verona, Museo civico 1, by G. Riccioni. *Norway*: The collection of material for a Norwegian volume is nearly completed. *Poland*: Warsaw 1–2, by Mlle L. Bernhardt. *Rumania*: Bucharest, Archaeological Museum 1. *Sweden*: Stockholm, National

Museum and Museum of Mediterranean Antiquities, by O. Vessberg. *Switzerland*: Geneva 1, Museum of Art and History, by Mlle Bruckner. *U.S.A.*: Metropolitan Museum 3 (Attic black-figure amphorae), by D. von Bothmer; Los Angeles, County Museum and local collections, by P. Clement; Portland, Art Museum, and Seattle, Art Museum, by D. A. Amyx; Princeton, Art Museum, and University Museum.

2. TABULA IMPERII ROMANI.—*Austria*: Preparatory work was completed on the sheets of Trieste, Milan, and Tegesta. The sheets relating to the *Limes* of Noricum and the western part of Pannonia would be undertaken next. *France*: The French section of the Milan sheet had been completed and that of Paris had been undertaken in collaboration with Belgium. In general France was behindhand in the project. *Great Britain*: The Ankara-Konia sheet was in preparation by the British Institute of Archaeology at Ankara. *Holland*: The sheet for Amsterdam, including parts of SE. England, was in preparation. *Italy*: Work had been begun on the Milan sheet. *Rumania*: The sheet for Lower Dacia was ready for the press; that for Scythia Minor was in preparation. *Spain*: Work had been begun upon the sheet based upon Barcelona. *Yugoslavia*: Steps had been taken to prepare the sheet for Sophia, including parts of Bulgaria, Albania, and Greece.

3. CORPUS PHILOSOPHORUM MEDII AEVI. (i) *Corpus Platonicum*.—The edition of *Calcidius* was in the press. (ii) *Aristoteles Latinus*.—This complete Corpus of the medieval Latin translations of Aristotle began slowly, but the recent appointment of a new Director (Dr. L. Minio-Paluello) and Editorial Committee has brought in prospect a number of new texts within the immediate future. The printing of the *Supplementum Codicum* is in hand; it consists of a number of important additions to the two volumes of *Codices* published in 1932-55.

4. ENCYCLOPAEDIA OF ISLAM.—See p. 12.

5. MONUMENTA MUSICAE BYZANTINAE.—See p. 11.

6. CODICES LATINI ANTIQUIORES.—The second volume of the most ancient Latin manuscripts preserved in German libraries appeared in 1959, constituting the 9th fascicule of the present series. Fascicule 10, dealing with the manuscripts preserved in the libraries of Austria, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Egypt, and Holland, is due from the Clarendon Press during the present year. Work was advanced on Fascicule 11, containing *inter alia* the imposing collection of manuscripts acquired by Russia during the French Revolution, and those collected in the U.S.A.

7. CATALOGUS TRANSLATIONUM ET COMMENTARIORUM.—Advance copies of volume I, which had been printed in Belgium, were in the hands of the Committee and would be published shortly. Volume II was in active preparation.

8. CORPUS VITREARUM MEDII Aevi.—*Austria*.—The volume on the glass-paintings of the Vienna churches was expected to be published in the autumn; it would include eight coloured plates. Steps were being taken to collect the material for a second volume. *Germany*.—The preparation of volume II dealing with Swabia was in preparation. It was hoped that the volume on the Rhineland might be completed in 1961. Work was also in progress on the windows of Cologne Cathedral. At Mülhausen the catalogue of the windows of St. Marien and St. Nikolai was complete, and work was actively proceeding with Erfurt. At Nuremberg the glass of St. Sebald and St. Lorenz was nearly ready for publication. At Regensburg-Oberfalz the material was also nearly ready. *Belgium*.—Volume I would probably be printed in 1961. *Spain*.—Work was proceeding on the glass of Aragon. *U.S.A.*—Material for volume I, dealing with most of the window glass preserved in the U.S., was in an advanced stage of preparation. *France*.—Volume VIII, dealing with the glass of Strasbourg Cathedral, and volume XVII dealing with Poitou and the Limousin were in preparation. *Great Britain*.—The appointment of Dr. Christopher Woodforde as Dean of Wells had interrupted the work of the National Committee, but steps were being taken to resume it on a new footing. *Poland*.—Materials for volume I had been collected in Malbork, Torun, and Włocławek; and work was proceeding on the churches of Notre Dame and Corpus Christi at Krakow and the glass preserved in the National Museum of Krakow. *Sweden*.—Work on volume I, dealing with the glass of Sweden, proceeds and it was expected that the volume would be ready in 1961. *Switzerland*.—Volume III, dealing with Swiss glass from the fourteenth century to the beginning of the sixteenth century, was in active progress.

9. CORPUS OF GREEK AND LATIN INSCRIPTIONS.—*Spain*.—The Catalan Supplement was in preparation. *Italy*.—The fascicule dealing with the *Fasti Juliani* by A. Degrassi was in the press.
