Here, the British Academy sets out six ways government can harness the vast potential of the humanities and social sciences and ensure the UK maintains its global reputation for excellence in these disciplines.

## **Speak up for the humanities and social sciences**

**We believe** that the insights our disciplines yield are among the UK's greatest strengths and are crucial to tackling the most significant challenges we face in the world today, from climate change to meeting the needs of an ageing society and tackling poverty.

**We call on** the government to speak up for the humanities and social sciences, alongside science, technology, engineering and mathematics, to make policy decisions grounded in evidence and to be vocal in its support for academics, practitioners and students of these disciplines.

## **Bolster our relationship with Europe and the rest of the world**

**We believe** that the UK benefits hugely from close ties with its neighbours both in Europe and the international research community.

**We call for** a close future relationship with our partners elsewhere in Europe, ensuring

the closest achievable association to future EU Framework Programmes. The government must support the humanities and social sciences to lead the way on global challenges and in doing so strengthen and enhance collaborative opportunities with countries across the world.

## Foster the right research environment

**We believe** that public investment in research and innovation is taxpayer money well spent: driving productivity, raising living standards and boosting our international reputation.

**We call on** the government to support increasing investment in UK research and development to 3% of GDP distributed across all disciplines and to ensure that we maintain a diverse funding landscape.

## Attract and retain global talent

**We believe** that a breadth of research and innovation talent allows us to pioneer new approaches and be a hub for the world; almost 3 in 10 UK academics are non-UK nationals.

**We call for** a fast, efficient and affordable future immigration system that welcomes researchers and their dependants, led by trusted organisations in the sector, that allows institutions to attract and retain talented individuals from overseas.

## Support a sustainable higher education system

**We believe** that the UK should play to its strengths by sustaining the pipeline of skilled arts, humanities and social science graduates that fuel the economy's largest sector – the service sector – which accounts for 80% of the UK's economy.

**We call for** a sustainable system of funding for our world-leading universities, which maintains a breadth of subjects and sufficiently funds both excellent further and higher education.

## Build a broad and balanced curriculum for everyone

**We believe** our young people need a range of skills, knowledge and insights. Our rapidly changing world of work calls for a flexible, multilingual workforce that communicates and collaborates, excels at analysis and problem-solving and thinks critically and creatively.

**We call for** a broad, balanced and interconnected school curriculum, allowing and encouraging students to study a range of disciplines and languages, including the arts, humanities and social sciences alongside science, technology, engineering and mathematics.
